Gillian Campbell-Thow	Managing Change, from good to great!	Stripping it back to basics: how do you promote languages, increase attainment and bring the staff with you? Managing transformational change to maximise potential and minimise professional trauma!
James Gardner	Does Takeaway Homework Actually Work?	Takeaway homework is one in a long list of recent "hashtag fads" pushed by the teaching Twitterati. The premise: to provide students with the opportunity to take control of what they do for homework and provide instant, self-managing differentiation in independent study for students. Plus some of the menus looked really funky. In this session, I will document my attempts at implementing this in a brand-new MFL department and incorporating it in our teaching. Has it worked? What do the students think? Or is it just another case of the Emperor's New Clothes?
Janet Lloyd & Julie Prince	Active Grammar	In this active participation session we'll explore ideas for classroom activities to boost the children's knowledge and understanding of grammar. Tried and tested ideas, such as Preposition Picnics, The Human Negatives Game and Rainbow Conjugation Rap, are a source of huge enjoyment and rich learning for the children. The new Languages Programmes of Study for KS2 state that children should "understand basic grammar" including "the conjugation of high-frequency verbs". This session will provide everything you need to help you guide your learners on the way to achieving this.
Ryan Hoy	Investigative Language Learning	Session will explore how to create a highly independent ethos using investigative learning methods such as intense challenge, problem solving and authentic collaboration. Practical activities will initiate delegates into the key tenets of investigative learning and example exercises will be shared. Reference will be made to recent research into MFL teaching and how this style fits with Ofsted criteria for 'outstanding'. Session will include discussion/viewing of an edited, professionally filmed lesson of this style, recorded in summer 2014 in presenter's school. I delivered a version of this session in summer 2014 at the annual conference of the National Association of Language Advisors in Stratford-upon-Avon. Feedback was overwhelmingly positive.
Lisa Stevens	Are you a Twit or a Tweep? (Twitter for beginners)	In this session we will explore the phenomenon that is Twitter. We will look at practicalities such as how to tweet and make a list and which app/site is "best" as well as unraveling some of mystery of hashtags, DMs, full stops, lists and #FF. We will also look at why Twitter is an invaluable tool not only in the classroom but also for CPD and explore how it might work in a language learning environment and as part of an international project. If you attend this session, you really will learn "how to make friends and influence people."

Alex Bellars	Questions, questions, questions	exploring the use of various tools and techniques to focus on effective questioning in the MFL classroom (including Socrative, Kahoot, InfuseLearning, Triptico and Plickers) to allow real-time formative assessment to feed back into the teaching and learning taking place
Clare Seccombe	Be a crafty Languages teacher!	This session will explore ways of using craft activities both as a language reference tool, and as a way to practise new language and structures. Come along to find out some alternatives to reading a worksheet and writing in an exercise book! The ideas can be transferred all languages and most ages of student.

Rachel Smith	Fabulous Formative assessment tools	In this session we will look at a variety of digital formative assessment tools that I have successfully used in my own classroom. These tools will include apps and web 2.0 tools examples that I intend to look at would be Nearpod, Educanon.com, Kahoot.com, Plickers, Zondle, Socrative, Google docs + flubaroo If we have time teachers would then be able to have a "play" with some of the sites/apps
Janet Lloyd	Adding drama to language learning!	A hands on and active learning session! Packed with simple, tried and tested ways to engage language learners across the key stages in creative language learning using drama and performance. During the session we will explore how to creatively link language and structure teaching and learning with Art, puppets, music, sound scenes, poetry and performance. 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Rory Gallagher	Spaced learning - the magic bullet for learning lots of stuff at once?	Spaced learning involves bursts of high intensity learning of words or key concepts, inter-spaced with 10 minute breaks where learners do physical rather than cognitive activities. It sounds like snake-oil, but seems to work quite well, and is based on some solid science (and a little anecdotal evidence too). A useful tool for learning or revising big chunks of information, with excellent retention rates especially when combined with spaced repetition.
Julie Prince	TechnoPhonics!	In this session we'll explore ways of integrating phonics into language teaching through the use of ICT. Teaching the sound-spelling system of the language is a powerful tool for helping your learners to improve their reading and writing skills, learn vocabulary and feel confident in their language learning. ICT provides the ideal medium for this. In this active participation session you will pick up practical ideas for classroom activities and have an (app-) smashing time!
